The final will consist of two parts- Essay questions from the last third of the class and the following question:

In *Backlashes Then and Now* Susan Faludi writes, "An accurate charting of American women's progress through history might look like a corkscrew slightly to one side, inching closer to the line of freedom with the passage of time, but, like a mathematical curve approaching infinity, never touching its goal. The American woman is trapped in this asymmetrical spiral, turning

endlessly through the generations, drawing ever near to her destination without ever arriving." Beginning with Seneca Falls and continuing until the 21st century as described in the book Good and Mad write an essay reflecting upon the validity of Faludi's thesis. Do you see examples of generational fits and starts and cycles of lost and found? Or is this a far too simplistic analysis that does not do justice to the economic, political, familial, and social layers and complexities making up the lives of women over the past 150 years?
